

Birds from Reed Swamps and Pond Banks

Reed swamps are a home of many bird species, giving them enough food and safe hiding for their nests. Individual bird species have their lifestyles bound to different parts and types of reed swamps and mostly do not compete against one another. Some species, e.g. starlings and swallows, use extensive reed swamps as a place to stay in the night. Most of these species are dependent on the reed swamps and cannot survive in other habitats; it is therefore very important to keep sufficient areas of reed growths along the ponds banks.

Nests in Reed Growths and on Pond Banks

- 1 - Reed Warbler (*Acrocephalus scirpaceus*)
- 2 - Bush Titmouse (*Remiz pendulinus*)
- 3 - *Circus aeruginosus*
- 4 - Water Rail (*Rallus aquaticus*)
